

# **Students** Where are they now?

# Trevor Cunningham Class of 1972

Former Chisholm College student, Trevor Cunningham (Class of 1972) has spent the last three years researching and writing about the development of social housing in the suburb of Braybrook, where he was raised from the age of 16, and where Caroline Chisholm Catholic College is still located.

Of his time at Caroline Chisholm Catholic College, he has this to say:

"I commenced at SJC in 1967 in St James 1 with Mr Henry Streulens as our form master. Henry was a hard taskmaster and a strict disciplinarian. He taught us History, RE, French and Latin in that first year. I remained a student of French for six years and he engendered in me a genuine love of languages. As a result, I have been studying Spanish for the past ten years.

Another teacher who influenced me was Mr Rohan McIndoe, who taught me English in Form 6. Rohan was a lawyer who had turned to teaching. He had an impressive manner in the classroom and I feel he was a factor in my decision to study law, combined with Science at Monash University. When I was practising law, I appeared in Court before Rohan who had returned to law and had been appointed to the Bench of the Magistrates' Court. Maybe he also influenced my decision to enter the teaching profession much later in life.

Amongst the religious, Br Bouchard stood out as an immensely hardworking and compassionate leader of the College.

I had many pleasurable experiences at SJC. Form 6 (1972) was the first year of being co-educational - a wonderful time in a completely foreign environment for the males. "

In 1970, he held the environment portfolio in the City of Sunshine Junior Council, an experience which ignited an interest in local affairs.


He credits our principal at that time, Brother Bouchard, for that appointment.

Trevor continued to develop that interest, and has pursued it during his life in a variety of ways, including through membership of a public hospital board of management, and several local government advisory committees.

His book, "Social Housing: Braybrook's Story", has now been published by Australian Scholarly Publishing.

The book is timely as the State of Victoria has embarked on an ambitious social housing program to address a severe housing shortage. The book exposes important lessons for the future arising from the historical context of a post-World War 2 housing shortage, when the Housing Commission developed the unique Melbourne suburb of Braybrook. Infrastructure was lacking and housing was often substandard. Although neglected by governments, residents created a positive community. A Royal Commission identified, then excused, some of the inherent faults. For the first time, this book intuitively recounts the stark history of Braybrook and poses questions about the likely success of the current State housing program. The book would be of interest not only to those with connections to Braybrook but also to people interested in local and State affairs in general, especially the critical issue of housing.

Trevor attended our reunion for the decadial classes of 1972, 82, 92, 02 and 12, and we look forward to hearing more about his work in the future,

# Mary Udovicic Class of 1984

Hello, I am Mary Udovicic, nee Buhagiar. I started at Christ the King College in 1979. I thoroughly enjoyed my four years there from Years 7 to 10. During this time, I also decided that teaching was the vocation I wanted to pursue. From 1983 to 1984 I completed Years 11 & 12 at Chisholm College. It was great to now be in classes with boys. Coming from a family with 5 siblings (3 brothers), it was great to be in mixed classes. During Year 11 I met my now husband, Frank. Chisholm College was also my introduction and start of a lifelong friendship with the Brothers of the Sacred Heart. Their charism and example complemented my Catholic upbringing and hence, my voluntary work in my parish and community started. Once graduating from Year 12, I completed a Fine Arts Degree at VCA, then continued to ACU and Melbourne Uni to gain my teacher qualifications. I am now into my thirtysecond year of teaching. I have taught at Chisholm College, CCCC, Genazzano FCJ College, Thomas Carr College and now at St Columba's College. What is consistent with all catholic colleges I have worked in is, students must know that you respect and believe in their capabilities, including genuinely promoting the formation of the whole person. In addition to teaching, I continue with my voluntary parish and community work as this is an important part of my faith and who I am. Thank you for this opportunity to share a little about myself. ### Frank Udovicic Class of 1984

Hi, I am Frank. I started at St John's College in 1979. At that time there was no Andre Coindre Centre and Administration Block, no D or E Block, no Cafeteria and certainly no computers in the library. It did however have a very diverse multicultural community of students and staff, and a caring and enthusiastic atmosphere cultivated by the Brothers of the Sacred Heart, who lived in their residence adjacent to the school. It was really at secondary school that study started in earnest and many skills were learned that I still use today. My memory of the teachers is positive and in retrospect they dealt well with large classes of students of diverse abilities and interests. A few that stand out; Mr Hamilton and his magic wand, Mr Knauth and his unique method of grading students' ceramic work, "What do you think it's worth?", Mr Bacon who made history interesting, Mr Devine for his remarkable ability to write beautifully, in French, on the blackboard whilst looking at the class behind him, Mr Naudi who for some reason wore a lab coat for Music, Mr Serong teaching us about Pythagoras and his fish 'n' chip shop in Maths, Mr Lange and his Mongolian Yurts in Geography, and Mr Brooks and his interesting classes in Mechanical Drawing.


In 1983 I started in Chisholm College, and finally we had girls in our classes too, one of whom, Mary, I was to later marry! It was in Chisholm that I decided that I was interested in Science and it was my Biology teacher, Br Clarence LeBreton SC who particularly captured my interest in Botany and the classification of plants. However, due to getting goods marks in HSC (what is now VCE) I got into Medicine at The University of Melbourne. After two years of Medical studies I came to the conclusion that my enthusiasm for science and understanding things was not being met. I transferred into Science where I majored in Botany and Zoology, then completed Honours, and in 1995 I completed my PhD in the Molecular Systematics of Eucalypts (using DNA fingerprinting to work out the family tree of gum trees, so we can get their classification right).

Following my studies, I worked for two years at CSIRO in Canberra, and then came back to Melbourne, where I resumed my work on eucalypts, and paperbarks and bottlebrushes. In 1999 I was appointed to the new position of Molecular Systematist at the National Herbarium of Victoria. The Herbarium houses 1.5 million pressed plant specimens and is arguably Victoria's oldest scientific institution, being 171 years old. The Herbarium is the scientific part of the Royal Botanic Gardens Victoria, and we conduct research into plant classification, relationships, conservation, population genetics and horticultural science. For the past 20 years I have been Manager Research at the Herbarium, a position that provides a satisfying mix of, continuing my own research including occasional field work, and managing other scientists, grants, budgets, and labs.

Looking forward to seeing the 1984 Year 12 graduating class at our 40-year reunion this year!!







The school community was heartbroken in March when our Principal, Robert Brennan, passed away after a short battle with cancer. Below we have included a number of reflections from staff and students, originally published in our newsletter.

Rob was a student at the College himself, and a local who grew up in the area. He wanted to come back and create a school that was the standard that the kids of the western suburbs deserved.

Every decision he made was with the students in mind and he wanted to make sure we were an inclusive community and one that was prepared to give back to the local community.

He understood the importance of programs such as our after school program and breakfast club which he ensured had funding and support so that all students had a safe space and felt a sense of belonging to our community.

For me, it was his honesty, passion for learning and genuine belief in our community that I find inspiring. Rob as a leader made sure people felt seen and heard and he modelled this in everything he did. He truly lived out the ethos of Catholic education, where the dignity of each person is paramount.

Through his passion for learning and teaching and his belief that all students have the right to a high-quality education, he transformed the learning culture here at the College.

In the three years he was our College principal, he improved our VCE results, and our average study score went from 28 to 30 increasing each year. Rob was cherished by all, and though his absence will be deeply felt, the College's leadership team is committed to carrying forward his legacy and realising his vision.

We will uphold his dedication to ensuring that every student feels valued and empowered to accomplish their dreams.

Mr. Brennan became principal of the College in 2021, the same year I was appointed house captain, and at that time, I was first exposed to his relentless and confronting determination. Being a Year 9 Captain seemed to be a minute role in the grand scheme of things, but he was sure to put that narrative to sleep when he put an emphasis on how important each leader was to the College. It was then I realised I actually can't take the mickey out this role and I need to try, or I'm done for.

I'd love our talks about footy and I am so very grateful that he, as a Richmond fan, showed mercy to me, a North Melbourne faithful, when talking about the current AFL season. His optimism never went unnoticed as he was persistent on getting CCCC to the top in academics and sports no matter the obstacles that stood in the way.

In fact, his optimism and ability to see the potential in individuals is the reason I applied for Sport Captaincy. I thought my time as a leader was up, and he was disappointed that I believed that. I'll never forget the meeting I had with him the week before the end of 2023 about the future of sports. He believed that I, along with all other members leadership could leave a long lasting impact. He believed this school was bound for greatness. I couldn't really see it, but Robert Brennan is the reason I can now see that vision. Although that was our last encounter, it was an encounter that demonstrated the man he was. His love for education was second to none, but nothing could, and nothing ever will, trump the love and care he showed towards his staff and students. The legacy he left after only three years in his role is so pure and strong that it will last for years to come. Mr. Brennan will always be missed but never forgotten.

I've known Mr Brennan since I was in Year 9. I met him on my first day as a Campus Captain.

From that day I knew he was going to be a person to count on and look up to. The way he interacted with us and was always ready to strike up a conversation about anything showed his commitment to making close relationships with us students because he truly cared for us. You would always see him taking the same route around the campus and being at the door everyday with a smile and 'good morning'. Many of us would get excited to see a Principal as involved as he was, and it motivated us to care more about school because we knew how much he did.

One of my last memories with Sir is one I hold very close to my heart. We had just done an assembly for the next year's Year 12s (us!) and I walked out of the school later than everyone else. Sir stopped me to ask if his speech was too boring, I laughed and told him no of course not, it was just the end of the day on a Friday and everyone was tired. He told me about his visions of the potential in our year level and the hard work we have ahead of us, and he left me with a quote that I later wrote in my notes - "You can only worry about what you can control, don't waste your time worrying about what you can't control" and I know that I can keep applying that to my situation anytime it gets hard, and I will get through it.

So I thank Mr Brennan and will forever remember the pride and trust he had in each and every one of us as students of the College whether they knew it or not, and I will continue to lead through my role now as a College Captain with his vision in mind.

#### A Man Of Faith

It can be hard to write about one's own faith and spirituality, yet to try and reflect on the contribution and faith-life of another is far more challenging. In this reflection on Rob Brennan I hope to sketch a few observations of a man of faith lived with trust, hope and love.

Drawing on Rob's love for the Salesians, a Catholic religious order founded by St John Bosco in 19th Century Italy, it is clear he took this charism to heart. Don Bosco, the founder, spoke of how "young people are not only [to be] loved, but that they themselves [must] know they are loved."

This is something I found remarkable in Rob. With the many busy demands on his time he never failed to be amongst the young people, especially when they were having recreation. This too was a piece of advice from Don Bosco, that when we educate and form young people we can achieve so much more if they trust and love their mentors. This can only truly come to fruition if educators, such as Rob, mingle among young people in the classroom, the yard, the prayer spaces and community gatherings.

It is remarkable then, that when Rob returned to Caroline Chisholm Catholic College, his alma mater, that he could bring with him the best of the Salesian charism while striving to embody the spirit of Caroline Chisholm. Caroline strove to uphold the dignity of women, young people, and those in need through employment, accommodation and education. When she was guiding others on how to work with young people she said: "much will depend on your conduct, as children learn more from example than precept."

How truly did Rob innately manifest this wisdom! When it could be simpler to speak of faith, acceptance, compassion and excellence, Rob's lived example of these values were more profound than any words. A man of steady faith, who accepted all people as they were, had compassion for the young – especially those most in need, and pushed himself and others to achieve excellence in all things. Blessed are we who were taught by Rob's example.

The final piece of the puzzle in the faith narrative I wish to recount is the centrality of the heart. Don Bosco always spoke of knowing the heart of a young person: to know them truly was to know their heart, their fears, hopes, dreams, strengths and weaknesses. Once we know a person's heart, we can offer them affirming love. However, the charism of the Sacred Heart so tied to our College also speaks to Rob's faith. From the brothers and sisters of the Sacred Heart our College has been gifted with a simple message: to believe in God's love, to live it, and to share it with our young people. Here Rob excelled. If education is a matter of the heart, let us recall Rob's loving kindness toward each young person, showing them the patience, forbearance, optimism and generosity their innate dignity deserved.

As we mourn Rob's passing may we also count our blessings for a man of faith who made himself a loving presence among them, not as a lofty individual, rather a humble educator for whom success was measured by the greater good of his faith community.

# Learner Mentor Groups At Caroline Chisholm Catholic College

At Caroline Chisholm Catholic College, we know that our students learn best and flourish when they feel respected, safe, connected and valued as members of our community.

The Learner Mentor Personal Development Program aims to acknowledge the challenges facing our young people today, as well as ensuring a connection to faith and the Catholic tradition. The program covers the following 'Five Pillars'

- 1. Leadership
- Decision Making
- 3. Study Skills
- 4. Personal Wellbeing
- 5. Relationships

Students have a Learner Mentor (LM) Group which they are assigned at the beginning of their time here at the College. This is similar to what was once called 'homeroom', but has a few key differences.

Firstly, students complete their core subjects (English, Mathematics etc.) in these groups, helping them forge strong bonds with one another in their early years. As they progress through their years with us, and start completing elective subjects, they maintain these bonds that they've built, even if they're no longer in the same subjects.

Secondly, students are expected to undertake a development program within their LM groups, focusing on both personal and spritual growth. Personal development elements cover a range of practical skills, including communication and lifeskills. Most recently in this department, our Year 9 students have learned about applying for a Tax File Number and it's use. It also includes team-building within each LM group, encouraging our students to build connections with one another, both within their LM groups and with other students in the school through arranged activites. Our spirtual elements include day-to-day Catholic religious adherence, such as experiencing Ash Wednesday crosses and Lenten sacrifices.

We aim to have students who leave our school well nourished in relation to themselves and others. Our Learner Mentor program encourages our students to think and act in ways that reflect the Catholic Ethos of every person having inherent human dignity.


# **Current Events Wrap-up**Top 20 Celebration


