



#### Three Campuses, One College

Caroline Chisholm Catholic College was established in 1997 when our three foundation schools, with roots stretching back more than 65 years, merged together. We honour the Brothers of the Sacred Heart, Religious Sisters of the Sacred Heart, parents, priests and parishioners who worked tirelessly to establish Christ the King College, St John's College and Chisholm College, enabling the children of Melbourne's inner west to access a Catholic education.





# Caroline Chisholm The Emigrant's Friend

Caroline Chisholm was not only a social reformer and advocate for the most vulnerable, she was also a visionary, leader, canny political operator and feminist as well as being a wife and mother.

Arriving in Australia, Caroline was appalled by the terrible plight of many of the young women who arrived from Britain with little food, money or understanding of their new land. With moral courage she took on the establishment. Beginning in a small cottage, Caroline welcomed these young girls, providing them with shelter and training. She set up a school and an employment agency to find positions for new arrivals, settling some 11,000 young women. She fought to set a minimum wage, work contracts and founded employment agencies in dozens of rural centres. Caroline accommodated multicultural families through her shelter sheds built on crown land in the western regions of Melbourne during the Gold Rush.

# Three Elements of Our Education

#### **RELIGION**

Our goal as a Catholic community is to remain faithful to the mission of the Church in proclaiming the faith and work of Jesus Christ. #### Faith in Action

When students join our College, they are placed into one of four Houses. Through these initiatives, student agency and ownership of specific causes are encouraged for all participants involved.

## Horizons of Hope

Horizons of Hope is an education framework supported by the Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools (MACS) to articulate the distinctive nature of pedagogy, curriculum, assessment, and religious dimensions of our Catholic school. This framework begins with vision, acknowledges context and supports strategy formation. These all work to enhance our practice in nourishing and forming the Catholic identity in our school.



At Caroline Chisholm Catholic College, we know that our students learn best and flourish when they feel Respected, Safe, Connected and Valued as members of our community.

At Caroline Chisholm Catholic College, the relationship between wellbeing and learning is critical to the growth of the whole person. Pastoral care at the College focuses on a positive and proactive approach, promoting the human dignity of each student. Feeling comfortable at school and being joyful and healthy has a direct impact on each student's ability for optimal learning, enabling them to flourish. Similarly, enjoying school and being engaged in learning influences a student's wellbeing, in particular their self-confidence and resilience.

Staff at the College are inspired to know each student's story, encourage their success, and guide them in the learning process. Our families are encouraged to know and understand their hopes for their children and to be informed and engaged in their child's learning; and together we inspire each other in our love of learning. Providing a range of programs and processes is fundamental to enabling all students to have the opportunity to be supported in achieving their full potential: spiritually, emotionally, intellectually, physically, socially, and culturally.



#### Learner Mentor

The Learner Mentor Program acts as the foundation for facilitating relationships between students, staff and parents/carers. They serve as coaches, mentors, guides and role models. They facilitate an open relationship, aiming to assist the students holistically and academically.

Our families are seen as partners and are encouraged to know and understand their hopes for their children and be informed and engaged in their child's learning; and together we inspire each other in our love of learning.

## Personal Development Program


Our four Houses – Ambrose, Clare, Galgani and Lorenzo – are named after saints who are remembered for their work with the poor, and their positive impact on society.













The College offers a range of core and elective subjects at junior levels which provides students with experiences in a variety of subjects. This ensures they have the skills and knowledge required to choose their individual pathways in their senior years.

#### Years 7-9 Pathways

Our program in Years 7 – 9 is designed to ensure students have access to a wide range of courses and learning styles in a single-sex setting. This lays the foundational knowledge, skills and understanding required for their future study. We offer an innovative and diverse curriculum that provides all students with opportunities for growth, learning and achievement.



## Gears 10-12 Pathways

The Years 10 – 12 learning and teaching program at Caroline Chisholm Catholic College offers a variety of study and numerous pathways.

Year 10 is designed to provide a foundation for future study and strengthen student's ability to plan their future pathways. Select students can extend their learning and study Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) and Vocational Education and Training (VET) subjects at Year 10.

#### **VCE**

We offer a wide range and variety of VCE subjects that provide our senior students with a breadth of choice and opportunity. Students who are academically inclined can study university subjects while still at school.

#### **VCE-VM**

The Victorian Certificate of Education – Vocational Major (VCE-VM) is an alternative pathway, which runs parallel to the VCE. It is a hands-on option for Years 11 and 12 students and provides practical, work-related experiences in both the classroom and workplace settings. The College offers a robust VCE-VM program that is supported by dedicated teachers and collaborative partnerships.

#### **VET**

The College offers Vocational Educational and Training (VET) units that deliver workplace specific skills and knowledge-based competencies. The curriculum delivered and assessment in these programs are based on the skills and knowledge needed to undertake tasks for a specific industry. Students undertaking VET units gain a nationally recognised qualification and earn credits towards completion of their VCE or VCE-VM program.

Some VET certificates are offered onsite at the College and as part of the College timetable\*, including certificates in:

- Applied Fashion Design and Technology
- Applied Languages
- · Community Services
- Health Services Assistance
- Laboratory Skills
- Music Performance
- · Small Business
- Sport and Recreation

The College also offers the opportunity for students to study VET certificates off-campus at local registered training organisations (RTOs), such as TAFEs, universities or other Secondary Colleges.

## Camps & Outdoor Education

Our Outdoor Education program promotes student's personal development while encouraging teamwork and positive attitudes towards the environment. All students in Years 7 – 9 participate in camps and safely build on their skills year-by-year under the supervision of our qualified and experienced outdoor education staff. The College's faith education is supported by our retreat and reflection day program, which sees all students participate in a series of Reflection Days each year during their time at the College.



#### Aspire

Aspire is Caroline Chisholm Catholic College's educational enrichment program for students in Years 7 – 9. Aspire enables dedicated and high achieving students to be challenged and provides opportunities for learning acceleration while promoting a range of personal and academic skills.

The program is designed for students who share a passion and commitment to learning, have exceptional abilities across multiple disciplines and are highly motivated to reach their full potential.

Aspire is accessed by invitation and based on academic testing and an application process. Details are provided to families when students are in Grade 6.





#### Scholarships

The College is committed to awarding annual scholarships to recognise personal excellence in curricular and co-curricular activities. We offer scholarships in the areas of Academic, General Excellence and Music.

## Performing Arts

Our annual College musical showcases not only our students' performing abilities, but also their backstage and front of house talents. Our musicals are student-led and all year levels are encouraged to get involved. Participating in the College musical enables students to experience the world of staged productions first hand and get to know like-minded students.



## Debating

The Debating program at the College is yet another way students can engage in co-curricular fields. Participants can compete regularly in Debaters Association Victoria events and are coached by passionate staff members, who are eager to assist students in their growth as speakers and support them in the experiences that arise.

A myriad of clubs of interest are available at the College. Ranging from Robotics club and sociology club to our passionate Eco Committee, Vinnies Social Justice group and various music ensembles - just to name a few. Students at our College can engage in their interests with supportive teachers and like-minded peers.





# Sports Program

Sport and physical activity are a key part of our holistic education and provides students with skills in leadership, teamwork, sportsmanship and perseverance.

Students can compete in a wide range of interschool competitions in several sports including swimming, golf, futsal and cross country running with the possibility of representing their region, state or country. Closer to home, they can test their skills against each other at the College's annual athletics carnival and other sporting events. We aim to provide students with the opportunity to participate in a wide range of sports and sporting experiences. In Years 7,8 and 9 the swimming program is compulsory for students to participate in, aiming to teach them this important life long skill.

Our College is a member of the Sports Association of Catholic Co-educational Secondary Schools (SACCSS) and is also affiliated with School Sports Victoria. This gives students the opportunity to compete against other schools with the chance of winning different premierships for the College.

# Music Program

Engagement with music can make a significant contribution to wellbeing as well as academic progress. At Caroline Chisholm Catholic College, we believe that learning to play an instrument and appreciate music is important for all students. Our programs are designed to provide a meaningful and fulfilling introduction to the art of performing, listening and composing. We provide students with opportunities within our extensive music program, including classroom music, instrumental music lessons, ensemble and band opportunities, VCE and VET music programs and our Encore program.

The College offers lessons in a range of instrument families, including:

#### Encore


The Encore program runs for two years throughout Years 7 and 8. For the duration of the program, students will be issued an instrument to take home and practice. They will be tutored in class by specialist music teachers on their selected instrument.

#### Scholarships

The College offers music scholarships at Year 7 based on an application process. The music scholarship will cover tuition, books and instrument hire for a period of up to 2 years.

We also offer private music lessons at an additional cost to any students interested (pending application) with the College covering up to a third of the cost.

## Counselling

Caroline Chisholm Catholic College is committed to providing a safe environment and assisting students to develop appropriate skills and attitudes to resolve problems in academic, psychological, emotional and social contexts.

Our counsellors are located at both sites, giving easy access for all three campuses and are readily available to all students. These professional counselling services are made available to all students as a free service. Our counsellors are also available to discuss concerns with parents and carers regarding their child by request.

#### Student Services

Both sites host a dedicated student services desk, operating from 8am – 4pm. This is a central place for students to go to for medical attention, questions and general communication.

## Cashless Card System

We operate a cashless canteen, which means students use their ID cards to pay for items. Funds can be topped up online via Compass or at one of the many Compass kiosks located around the College.







## Bus Services

A College shuttle bus operates between our two sites – 65 and 204 Churchill Avenue. This assists students who have scheduled classes at the different campuses during the day.

Public buses operate daily to and from the College, along with special services arranged between the College and PTV from time to time.

## Tutoring

The College offers group tutoring for all students throughout the school year with support in literacy and numeracy as key areas. There are additional one-on-one or group tutoring opportunities by learning areas throughout the year and in the lead up to exams.





## Enrolment Process for Year 7

It is vital to apply for Year 7 when your child is in Grade 5. Applications for Year 7 close mid-August each year.

## **1. Complete an enrolment application form.**Visit **www.ccc.vic.edu.au** to access and complete our online Application Form.

#### 2. Submit your completed application form.

Ensure you provide all required documents with the application. A non-refundable application fee is required at the time of submission. Applications close mid-August each year.

#### **3. The College will conduct interviews of all applicants.**Families will be invited to attend an enrolment interview with a senior staff member of the College after the application deadline.

#### **4. Enrolment and waiting list offers will be sent to families.** Families will be notified of any offer after the interview process.

Please note that enrolments for Year 7 are processed by the College when your child is in Grade 5, and not prior.

For enrolments outside this period, applications follow steps 1 and 2 above and students are placed on a waiting list. When a position becomes available the waitlist is reviewed and the College will begin the interview process with the prospective family.

The College is governed by the MACS Enrolment Policy which can be found on our website.
